HOLDS PROCESS WAS REGULAR

Judge Troup Decides Case in Favor of Herman Kountze and the Creightons.

Judge Troup has handed down a decision in favor of the defendants in the suit whereby the four children of the late Mrs. Mary McCreary, a sister of Edward Creighton, deceased, sought to have a reaccount ing of the administration of the Edward Creighton estate. The suit was against John A. Creighton, administrator and trustee, and Herman Kountze and James Creighton, trustees, and it was alleged that the first named had not made a full accounting for a large herd of cattle, said to be valued at \$800,000, which roamed in Wyoming near the Nebraska line at the time of Edward Creighton's death in 1874.

The herd was sold at auction for about \$75,000, John A. Creighton being the successful bidder, the sale being confirmed by a Wyoming court. The plaintiffs held that the administration, being in Wyoming, did not apply to the cattle that was on the Nebraska state line, and alleged that this never had been accounted for by the trustees. Judge Troup held that there had been no fraud, that the matter had been adjudicated time and again and that the proceedings were in every way regular and correct, inasmuch as the whole herd of stock belonged to a single ranch in Wyo-




