

The American athletes are confident they will win six of the fine events, while the Englishmen believe the odd event will determine the victor, as they expect to win four. The two miles, the mile and the half mile the Englishmen regard as sure, Churchill of Cambridge, Gregson of Cambridge and Cornwalls of Oxford being slated by them as the winners.

The English experis expect W. A. Schich, ir., of Harvard to win the 100-yards, E. J. Clapp of Yale the high lump and they say they would not be surprised to see them break the records.

The American and English teams arrived in London this afternoon.

Efforts were made to induce King Edward to attend the games After the games a banquet will be given, which will be presided over by Lord Chief Justice Alverstone. stone is the intention of the English promoters of the meeting to make it an international rather than a merely athletic event, in the hope of thereby fostering the friendly rivalry of the two countries.
