## TRADE CONTINUES TO EXPAND

Cool Weather Stimulates the Demand for Fall and Winter Clothing.

MERCANTILE COLLECTIONS LESS TARDY

Production of iron and Steel Steadily Increasing-Less Idle Machinery Than at Any Recent Date.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s

Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say:

Trade expands stendily as confidence increases with the harvesting of the crops, and mercantile collections are less tardily met. Lower temperature stimulates the demand for fall and winter wearing apparel and there is more disposition to prepare for the future rather than to confine operations within the limit of immediate requirements. This improvement is extending to all departments of manufacture and on the aggregate there is less idle machinery than at any recent date. Settlements of labor disputes have helped in the development of this condition. Railway earnings for September were 5.7 per cent larger than a year ago and foreign commerce at this port for the last week shows a gain of \$2.945.687 in exports as compared with 1803, although imports decreased \$713.670.

There is no evidence of an anxiety among consumers of iron and steel to place large orders or to secure quick delivery, yet the tounage gradually expands and it is evident that the lowest point of the depression has passed. Production steadily increases, prices are more readily maintained and the number of pending contracts promises well for the future. It is difficult to point to any one division as the leader, improvement being of a general character that is most wholesome. Starting up coke furnaces augurs well for the future, and the botter demand for bituminous coal is encouraging. Tin is erratic in response to London fluctuations rather than any domestic influence, but copper is strong because of heavy exports.

Moderate gains continue to be made by the textile Industries, particularly as to woolens and worsteds. Staple lines are quoted somewhat higher and prompt deliveries are urged by purchasers. Increased activity at the mills has helped to sustain the eastern markets for wool and brisk competition at the London suction sales was also a factor of importance. Irregularity in cotton goods must be attributed to an erfatic demand that emanates from uncertainty regarding the raw material. Activity is greatest in cases where stocks are low and this urgent business is done at full prices, but concessions occur on other sales that call for future delivery. Firminess continues in packer hides, independent tamers making liberal purchases. Large sales of branded and Colorado hides are recorded and there is the usual concession on hides taken off during the strike by inexpertanced men. Country bides are weaken, but receipts of foreign dry hides are uniefly absorbed. Lower grades of hemlock sale leather are still active and other ince are steady but quiet. Boot and shoe jobbets are seeking to place supplementary orders for fall snows, stipmating quick delivery, which indicates that their holdings are small.

marked in dry goods, clothing, groceries, shoes and hardware. Distributive trade is better in the northwest, portions of the east and very generally throughout the south. The central west also shows a continuance of the improvement noted last week and a widespread moderate betterment in collections is a feature deserving special mention. A disposition is shown on the part of farmers to hold their products for better prices, this being true in many sections, notably the south and southwest. The labor situation is rather quiet on the whole, though many large strikes continue unsettled. Wood has been firm this week, the statistical position being a strong one, and the firmness being aided by reports of further contemplated advances in the finished product. Press woolens have been and are in good demand, but men's wear fabrics have hardly moved as fast as desired.

GUARD AGAINST PRAIRIE FIRES Residents of South Dakota Take Steps

to Protect Property. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Sept. 23 -- (Special.) The rank growth of vegetation throughut the state this season and the fact that thus far the fall has been a very dry one, renders it necessary for extraordinary precautions to be taken against the starting of prairie fires.

One of the leaders in the movement to guard against these disastrous fires is Charles E McChesney, United States Indian agent at Rosebud agency. He recently issued to his subordinates in the various subdistricts on the reservation instructions to construct fire guards in each subdistrict and for every white person and Indian to turn out promptly, either day or night, to prevent any prairie fires which may be started from spreading and sweep-

ing over adjoining districts. The subordinate officials are authorized to employ Indiana, at the rate of \$1.25 per day, to plow fire guards, and a large number of the red men are now engaged in the work. In the past prairie fires have done great damage on the Rosebud reservation and Agent McChesney proposes that the losses from this source this season shall be reduced to the minimum. Similar precautions are being taken on the other Indian reservations and at various points throughout the central and northern parts

Some damage already has been done in the agricultural portion of the state by prairie fires. A fire which was started near Wessington Springs by sparks from an ash pile left by a threshing crew swept over Cool Weather Stimulates Wholesale quite as extensive area and destroyed a great deal of hay, pasturage and fencing before it was extinguished by farmers who turned out by the score to fight the
