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GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Cash Grain in Omaha in Demand and Higher Prices Are Paid.

RELATIVELY HIGHER THAN OTHER MARKETS

Futures Open Strong, but Slightly Lower at Decline-Corn Acts Same Way-Outs Firmer -Gossip, Stocks.

OMAHA, Oct. 12, 1904. Wheat was slightly higher at one time today in the speculative market and again it was slightly lower.

The car of No. 2 northern wheat sold at \$1.10, No. 3 spring as high as \$1.05, and No. 4 spring at \$1.00. Of course the bulk of the grain going to the market is hard wheat, but the prices indicate that the market is not so far from the average.

Hard wheat averaged \$1.04 to \$1.05 for No. 2 spring wheat, \$1.00 for No. 3 spring wheat, and \$0.95 for No. 4 spring wheat.

Wheat, testing 5 pounds, sold at \$1.00. These are all comparatively high prices as compared with the market elsewhere.

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FUSHIMI JAPAN'S HERO PRINCE

Half-Brother of Mikado Passes Through Omaha on His Way to See the President.

His imperial highness, Lieutenant General Prince Fushimi, half brother to the Mikado of Japan and in line for succession to the throne, stopped in Omaha about half an hour last evening on his way from Japan to Washington and other American cities.

Prince Fushimi comes to this country on a special mission from the Mikado of Japan. He is a friendly one, and the mission is a friendly one, and the prince will not commit himself until after having visited the White House.

The imperial party arrived on the Union Pacific Overland No. 2 at 10:30, two hours late, and proceeded to Chicago over the Chicago & Northwestern as seen as the train was ready for departure.

Dr. Rosenkranz was the only one of the party to appear at the solicitation of a number of reporters and others who wished to interview the prince.

"The prince is asleep and will not be disturbed," said the doctor, who is physician to his imperial highness.

"May we not see Mr. A. Sato, grand master of the imperial household and interpreter for Prince Fushimi?" was asked of the doctor.

"Mr. Sato is asleep," said the doctor. "As the party left the private car the outline of a face very much like a description received of the prince was seen peering out of the window of the car."

The prince and party called on the Manchuria October 25 and will embark on the homeward journey at San Francisco December 20 on the Japanese steamer. After spending about five hours in Chicago Sunday the party will proceed immediately to Washington and then visit New York, Boston, Philadelphia, St. Louis and a number of other cities.

Prince Fushimi is 35 years of age, married, and has two sons and one daughter. He is the idol of the empire, standing high with the military and the people. He served with distinction in the battle of Manahan hill. He does not speak English. He is accompanied by interpreter A. Sato, a graduate of Harvard. A number of informal receptions have been tendered the prince and party since they arrived at San Francisco. The prince is not averse to being photographed, but will not talk on military subjects.

The prince's entourage, besides the prince, Count S. Terahama, Mr. A. Sato, Dr. Rosenkranz, Major Mihara and Mr. Moffitt, the last mentioned being a member of the United States secret service.
