ote and five feeble voices answered "yea." Rev. E. Comble Smith called attention to this fact, when a rising vote was taken, resulting in a large affirmative majority. Rev. H. C. Herring then moved that after Mr. Rosewater had been notified of the union's action by letter the letter be for the athletes. given to the press. But other ministers resented this method of treating Mr. Rosewater and the result was an emphatic turndown for the Herring motion. Dr. Clyde Clay Cissell of the Hanscom Park Methodist church, in objecting to this matter, declared he was not in sympathy with the sentiment of the Herring-Conley-Smith letter. Dr. Newman Hall Burdick of the Presbyterian church, Dr. Edwin Hart Jenks of the First Presbyterian, Rev. A. S. C. Clarke of Lowe Avenue Presbyterian, Rev. Leonard Groh of St. Mark's Lutheran church and Dr. D. K. Tindall of the South Omaha Methodist, expressed such strong sentiments against turning over the letter to the public that the Herring motion was unable to pull through. Rev. A. S. C. 
