VON MALLER FOUND GUILTY

Jury Agrees on Verdict of Murder in the Second Degree.

COMMENDS PRISONER TO COURT'S MERCY

Long Debate in Jury Room Comes to End After Disagreement Seems the Only Probable

Ontcome.

George Von Haller was found guilty of murder in the second degree by the jury which has been considering his case since Saturday noop. The jury came into court with its verdict shortly before 5:30 Monday

Accompanying the verdict of the jury was a recommendation to the court for leni-

Judge Day had directed the bailiff to bring the jury into court about 3:40, and had asked if there was any chance of an agreement being reached. Some of the jurors rather intimated there was not, but some insisted there was still a chance for

agreement. A question was raised by two of the jurors as to the exact meaning of one or two expressions in the court's charge to the jury. Judge Day said he did not feel like revising any part of the charge and the jury retired for further consideration.

Judge Day had said that he would allow a reasonable time for further consideration and agreement, but gave the intimation that if he became convinced there was no such chance he would feel like again calling them in and discharging them. He alluded to the great cost to the county of the trial, but was fiberal in his review of the duty of the jury-

After being out another hour and a half the jury reported it had reached an agreement and when brought up from the subterranean depths of the court house gave the verdict as detailed.

No Relatives Present.

When the verdict was returned into court neither Mrs. George Von Haller, his wife, Mrs. Mary Von Haller, his mother, or any other relative was in court. Mr. Jefferts and Mr. Shoemaker, his lawyers, were there, as was County Attorney Slabaugh and two of his assistants. Mr. Jefferis demanded a poll of the jury, and each man, as his name was called, answered that the verdict was his.

The punishment for murder in the second degree, under the Nebraska law, is not less than ten years in the penitentiary or life imprisonment, in the discretion of the

In discharging the jury Judge Day complimented them on their conscientious discharge of a most disagreeable duty. He said that during the two weeks of separation from their families his sympathies had been with them. As a slight token of his appreciation of their services he would excuse them from service for one day and possibly he might overlook a missing of a roll call on a second day without holding them guilty of contempt of court. Von Haller took the announcement of the jury's verdict without an indication either of disappointment or elation

NEW SCHOOL FOR NORTHWEST Old Monmouth Park Building Goes to

a New Site Without Delay.

The work of moving the old Monmouth Park school building, which consists of a two-room frame structure, from its present location at Thirty-third street and Meredith avenue, to Thirty-sixth street and Kansas avenue, has been started. When in position on the new site the school will be opened, with one teacher in charge and under the jurisdiction of the Central Park school, according to the present plans of the board. A new school will be created by the change at the request of the Newport-Belvidere Improvement club, which urged the matter in a letter to the Board of

The chief reason for the new school is that there are from forty to fifty children of ages attending the fourth grade down, living in the extreme northwestern part of the city, who have to walk exceptionally long distances to the Mon-mouth Park and other schools. A new district will be created for these youngsters as soon as the new school, which will be known as the Central Park annex. is ready for use. Arrangements have been made for the purchase of an acre of ground at Thirty-sixth street and Kansas avenue for \$200. Though no definite action has been taken on the subject the present plans of the board are to open the school just as soon as it can be moved and put

Already two aspirants for the janitorship have manifested their desires. It is not improbable that this duty will be placed n the hands of the janitor of the Central Park school and a small sum set aside for the hiring of an assistant. A new job is in sight, because the Central Park school is a long distance from the site of the annex.
