Threshing returns in Argentina are claimed to show a crop of 148,000,000 bushels, or 25,000,000 bushels more than the crop of last year. For that crop 24,000,000 bushels were exported, that being the heaviest on record. Carrying forward the same ratio, the export this year would be 100,000,000 bushels. Minneapolis millers have advanced the price of flour 10 cents. Duluth has sold 200,000 bushels of No. 2 northern wheat for Buffalo mills. The primary receipts are 25,000 bushels, against 404,000 bushels last year, and the shipments are 28,000 bushels, against 289,000 bushels last year.

Corn buills expect corn to go up because for the same table to the corn to go up because year, and the shipments are 285,000 bushels, against 285,000 bushels last year.

Corn bulls expect corn to go up because fat cattle are selling at \$6.15, hogs at \$5.45, receipts are to be light in a few weeks and the export demand is good. The cash handlers profess to expect the cash corn to go to a premium over the May. Country roads are bad and the receipts are getting lighter everywhere, and it is expected they will be very small next month. An elevator man who has just come through northern Missouri and southern lows is quoted as saying he saw only about 40,000 bushels of corn in cribs and that feeders were offering 50 cents for corn, and that no grain was being moved out. The primary receipts are \$83,000 bushels, against \$25,000 bushels last year, and the shipments are 474,000 bushels, against 242,000 bushels last year.

Some oats handlers are claiming that the July will sell at a premium over the May. They say northwestern hedges are being taken out of May and put into July. With the increase in stocks more pressure will be brought for selling from the people who have May to liquidate. This situation will, it is believed, depress the May market. It is claimed oats seeding has begun in central lows two weeks to twenty days earlier than last year.
