What the employers take as a sign of the and of the strike was a telegram sent by President Shoa of the Teamsters' union to President Gompers. The message arranged for a meeting of the Executive board of the American Federation of Labor to be held in Chicago near the end of the present week. President Shea also telegraphed the members of the Executive board of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters to come to Chicago forthwith. It is expected this body will meet in Chicago on Wednesday or Thursday. These officials have the final word in calling or putting an end to a strike of the teamsters' organization. They are the same men who were called to Chicago last year

to put an end to the strike of the teamsters at the stock vards, and it is believed by the employers that they have now been summoned for a similar purpose.

More Wagons in Service.

The employers today operated 2,000 wagons practically without interference, many of the deliveries in the residence portion of the city being made without police protection. It is asserted that the numbe f wagons in service today will in creased by 250 tomorrow and that this ratio will be continued until the full number of wagons is in service again.

Dr. Kolisher, however, was unable to explain the alleged fact that all the poison found in the body of Mrs. Welcker-Hoch was in the stomach and liver.

The doctor refused to admit that Mrs Hoch was poisoned by arsenic, as he said "there are any number of things that might have caused her death.
