At All Saints' church Sunday morning Colonel Alexander Hogeland, "friend of the newsboys," originator of the curfew law and promoter of the welfare of the ur-

chins who earn their livelihood on the streets, delivered a short address to the congregation on behalf of the curfew and its enforcement in Omaha. He asked the co-operation of his hearers in promoting the curfew movement in Omaha and doing

their share toward its enforcement.
