ENVOYS ARE NAMED

Russia and Japan Make Tentative Selections of Peace Plenipotentiaries. OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT EXPECTED. Baron Rosen and M. Nelidoff will represent Russia.

KOMURA AND TAKAHIRA FOR M. O.

Later Will Probably Be Raised to Rank of Ambassador. LITTLE PROSPECT OF ARMISTICE.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Russia has given assurance in the peace negotiations by placing the president in possession of the tentative selection of her plenipotentiaries as follows: M. Nelidoff, the Russian ambassador at Paris, and Baron Rosen, the newly appointed Russian ambassador at Washington.

Official announcement of the names of the plenipotentiaries is withheld for several reasons. Mr. Nelidoff's health may not permit him to make the trip and pressure of official work may necessitate the presence in Tokio of Baron Komura.

Similar views are expressed in the German press. The writers arguing that Great Britain having gotten rid of Russia for a generation through the war in the far east is deliberately working to fan the flames of contention between Russia and Germany.
