ST. PETERSBURG, June 27 .- 8:35 a. m Hostilities in Manchuria apparently have not reached the stage of a general engagement. Dispatches from both commanders indicate that there is a steady skirmishing along the main front, where minor detachments are fighting back and forth over practically the same ground, with no deciding advantage to either. These tactics seem designed chiefly t

> Lutheran Synod Appropriates \$26,000 for the Construction of New Hall and Class Rooms

DETROIT, Mich., June 26 .- The triennial convention of the Evangelistic German Lutheran synod of Missouri, Ohlo and other states, in session today, voted an appropriation of \$30,000 for the erection of a new building at the St. Louis Theological seminary.
