The action of the bondsmen in withdrawing from her bond was precipitated when papers were filed in the office of the register of deeds conveying to George W. Egan of Logan, In. the O'Grady farm, the bill of sale covering all the O'Grady personal property.
It appears that Mrs. O'Grady discharged

the Sloux Falls attorneys whose services she engaged soon after the tragic death of her husband and who represented her at the coroner's inquest and at her preliminary hearing.
