Begin Hearing to Stop Competition by the Express Companies,

Special Examiner George M. Brown of the Interstate Commerce commission from Washington, presided Monday morning at the hearing of the Western Fruit Joboers' association against the American, Adams, United States and Wells-Fargo Express companies in the matter of the sale of nodities by the express companies.

The hearing is being held under the resolution of the United States senate of March 2, 1907, and proceedings instituted thereunder March 17, 1907, requiring the express companies to make answer under the act. Each of the express companies admits it is operating an order and commission des partment and all have filed answer except the Adams company.

The question at issue is whether the alleged order and commission departments of the express companies is operated to the prejudice of the public and the commission men.
