This is in striking contrast to the condition in Omaha, where not a single real estate dealer can be found who has been compelled to reduce prices, and sales continue good. North of the Ohio river there is a fair demand for business and residence property, but rentals are lower and few buildings are being erected. Southern cities report normal conditions. An Omaha real estato man has received a letter from Jacksonville, Fla., stating that seventy-three new buildings are in process of construction. The business depression in the south has been counteracted by the high prices which growers are receiving for their cotton, as the depression in the west has been kept afar off by the good prices which farmers are receiving for corn and wheat and have received since the crop was gathered. In the extreme west the conditions about Omaha are shared. There is money for all local needs in the banks, the farmers are prosperous and the section is in better condition to maintain prices and rents and renew activity in real estate than almost any other section of the United States.

The large number of small homes being bought by Omahans will show in the course of a few years that a larger number of Omaha people own their own homes than in most cities of the west. During the week no less than a score of small homes have been secured by people who intend to live in them. Among them are such new cottages as that on the southeast corner of Thirty-first and Meredith avenue, which was sold by Hastings & Heyden to Elizabeth Osborne of Calhoun, Neb., for a home. The same firm has sold a five-room cottage at 330 Seward street to L. Z. Eldridge for \$1,700, a six-room cottage at 114 North Thirty-seventh street to Mary A. Robo of Lexington, Neb., for a home and a lot at Nineteenth and Spencer streets to J. P. Jerpe, who will build a home at once The consideration for the lot was \$1,150.
