FREIGHT HANDLERS DICTATE

Des Moines Railroad Men Will Strike

Today Unles "Rsaised" -- Seven Cents an Hour Demanded.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, May 2.-(Special Telegram.)-Failing to secure a satisfactory answer from the railroad officials, the local Freight Handlers' union has given the raliroads until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to answer their request for a higher wage scale. It is likely that the union men will refuse to work if the railroads do not comply with their request. According to the statement given out to-

day by the president of the local, the new wage scale as submitted by the union, calls for an increase of from \$55 to \$80 a month for receiving, check and delivery clerks Stevedores ask an increase from 18 cents to 25 cents an hour, caller from 171/2 cents to 25 cents an hour and truckers from 17% cents to 23 cents an hour.
