Council Bluffs
COUNCIL ORDERS REPAVING
 Members Vote Vitriolized Brick on Small Part of Two Streets.

BAR FOR CITY WATER PLANT
 Mayor Maloney Congratulates Members on Action, Declaring It Step Toward Newer and Better City—Harding Approves.

In a special session called for the purpose of the city council last evening took the first decisive steps toward repaving Broadway and South Main street, disregarding in a measure the nearly unanimous protest of the property owners against disturbing the present rough granite stones. The council amended the original paving resolution, which specified the repaving of the entire granite-covered surface on the two streets, and limited the improvements to a small area in the central part of the main business section. The resolution as passed provides for repaving of Broadway from the east side of Second street to the west side of Sixth street and Main street from Broadway to the south side of First avenue. The material to be vitriolized brick laid on a five-inch concrete base.

When It Came to the First Ward Alderman Harding of the First ward voted against the paving resolution, explaining that he did so for two reasons, first because as a member of the council he felt that he had obligated himself to be controlled by the wishes of the people, and he could not vote for an improvement that was almost unanimously objected to by those most vitally interested; and second, because the laying of even that small area of pavement on a permanent concrete base made it more difficult for the people in relation to the ownership of the water works, either by purchase of the present plant or the construction of a new system. He said with even such a small obstacle as this it would be impossible to secure approval of the property owners to tear up the street again to lay new pipes. It meant, in his opinion, one step further toward defeating the purpose of the people to achieve municipal ownership. All of the other members of the council voted for the resolution and Mayor Maloney, after congratulating them upon their courage, declaring that it was the beginning of a movement for a newer and better city.

He alleged that one end of the iron was without support and tipped when he stepped upon it, causing him to fall violently. He alleges that he suffered a severely sprained ankle and numerous bruises elsewhere. The alleged accident occurred on the night of July 4.
