Enormous Wholesale Business Done for Gate City Houses Every Year.

VOLUME IS CONSTANTLY GROWING

Annual Increase Shows Development of Omaha Territory.

EVERY LINE IS REPRESENTED

Substantial Houses Engaged in the Handling of Everything.

WHAT YEAR'S FIGURES SHOW

Tabulated Statement for 1909 Proves Omaha to Be in Front Rank as a Wholesale Point.

With sixty-one different kinds of manufacturing establishments, Omaha had an output of products to the aggregate value of \$101,872,000. The various jobbing industries likewise passed the hundred-million mark in volume by a considerable margin.

An inspection of the list of Omaha manufacturers reveals the fact that the widest sort of diversity characterizes the manufacturing activity of the city. Some of the most novel articles of manufacture to be imagined are among the output of local concerns, in the same surprising volume as that attending the manufactures in immensely larger cities than this.

In considering the reasons for Omaha's good fortune in possessing and attracting manufacturing activity, those in the leading business explain first and foremost the fact that the town is happily blessed with many railroads and is situated as advantageously in this respect as any city in the country.

The facility with which materials may be assembled here is one which makes its appeal readily to all discerning manufacturers. Freight rates and time when they are the chief influencing condition.

manufacture of the heavy products in Omaha, as such products had not been manufactured to a very great extent here previously.

Beer, close to the top in alphabetical order on the list, also is close to the top in the value of yearly output. There was \$3,700,000 worth of the hops made beverage produced here last year.

Omaha is coming into recognition as a great dairy town. Its creameries and dairy product concerns put out a total of \$4,756,000 worth of butter alone in 1909. In this kind of manufacture more clearly than in others is the city's location shown to be of great advantage.

White lead is on the increase, as the Carter White Lead company has doubled the effect of this is not so apparent on last year's business the business for this year should be doubled.

Stroud & Co., manufacturers of dirt moving machinery, has expanded until its business has reached \$600,000 a year. The extent of this business was shown last week, when Mr. Stroud received a photograph of one of his machines being moved by oxen in South Africa.

In the manufacture of clothing Omaha supplies a great territory, and is increasing rapidly the amount of its output. The clothing manufactured here last year totaled a value of \$2,775,000.

Omaha has many manufactures which have not been included in the lists heretofore, but which have been developing their business until it has reached large proportions.

Manufacturing of confectionery has become a big business for all sorts of badges and novelties for conventions and fairs are made in Omaha. Church furniture to the amount of \$100,000 was made in this city last year to be sent all over the west.

In jobbing the city has merely risen by the normal weight of its manufactures to the importance of necessity due to it. Forty-eight different kinds of jobbers make up the business. Many different concerns in each individual line swell the ranks and keep the distribution of products up to an enormous volume every year. The value of the jobbing done last year was \$115,133,000. New industries, both manufacturing and jobbing, are coming into the city's life in gratifying numbers every year.

MILLIONS OF STORAGE SPACE

Omaha is Well Equipped with Plants that Are Fireproof, as Well as Slow Burning Buildings.

Twenty years ago, to be exact, in 1891, there was no storage business in Omaha worthy the name; today the industry is among the city's largest enterprises. Omaha's first storage house was established by Oliver Maggard at the corner of Sixteenth and Leavenworth streets in 1892, and consisted of nothing more pretentious than a good sized barn. Mr. Maggard, however, soon tired of the business and disposed of his interests to the Omaha Van and Storage company, which was the pioneer in the local field. Since then, however, the business has increased to many times its volume at that time and the present business is divided among about a dozen companies strong and well equipped to work.

Until the last few months the storage business has been somewhat handicapped by the high rates of insurance which the companies demanded, because the warehouses were not fireproof in their construction. But this condition has been largely alleviated within the last year, two of the larger companies having made provision for fireproof warehouse space. The Omaha Van and Storage company has but recently completed a fine new building at 94 South Sixteenth street, and the Expressmen's Delivery company has one nearly completed at Eleventh and Davenport streets.

The storage business, as is the case with other lines of business, runs by seasons. From May 1 until the latter part of June is the season of the year when goods pour into the storage houses, while from the latter date until about the first of September there is little moving of goods either in or out of the warehouses, the withdrawal season lasting through the latter part of the year. At the present time, then, the warehouses are accommodating about the largest amount which they will hold during the year, and the Omaha houses are uniformly reported as well filled.

The local companies, in most cases, compare with the storage feature of their business a general hauling, packing and shipping business and handle, between them, the bulk of the business in those lines. The stage which the specializing process has reached, even in the storage business, may be noted from the fact that one of the local companies is advertising that its new warehouse is to contain private trunk rooms, heated piano rooms and other features which appeal with equal strength to the fancy of the well-to-do.

Probably the bulk of the Omaha storage business is done in merchandise, the companies taking the goods from the merchant who happens to be temporarily over-supplied and holding them until he is able to give them space. Several of the companies, however, handle household goods among them the Omaha Van and Storage company and the Expressmen's Delivery company. In addition to the strictly storage firms, many of the implement firms do a considerable amount of storage and forwarding business. None of the strictly storage firms have a department devoted to cold storage.

All of the storage men of the city are confident as to the future of their business and well they may be when the remarkable development, which has attended the business since the past is remembered. The total space devoted to storage purposes in Omaha will amount to in the neighborhood of 2,000,000 cubic feet, about 1,250,000 of which is fireproof storage. These figures are not inclusive of the amount of space which implement companies devote to storage purposes. It is next to impossible to place an estimate on the amount or value of goods stored in a year, for the reason that the periods for which the goods are stored vary so, as does the amount of the different articles which occupy an equal amount of space.

The local exclusive storage companies are: William Bushman company, 1015 Leavenworth street; Counsman-VanBurgh company, 156 North Sixteenth street; Expressmen's Delivery company, 208 North Sixteenth street; Merchants storage company, 1207 Jones street; Omaha Van and Storage company, 300 South Seventeenth street; Omaha Warehouse company, 1609 Jones street; Omaha Wool and Storage company, Twenty-eighth and Gold streets, and Pacific Storage and Warehouse company, 1097 Jones street.

ready they are furnishing more drugs to local dealers than the outside firms. There are three large wholesale drug firms, although several of the retail druggists do a bit of wholesale work. These larger firms are the American Druggists' syndicate, the Richardson Drug company and the E. E. Bruce Drug company. None of these concerns do any manufacturing except the Richardson people, who devote a portion of their large floor space at Ninth and Jackson streets to pharmaceutical manufacturing.

Figures on the business of the various wholesalers in the city—and every firm which gave them stated that they were conservative rather than otherwise—will total approximately \$5,000,000 for the year. The manufacturing business will amount to \$200,000. From these figures something of what the drug business, wholesale and manufacturing, means to Omaha in a year, can be gathered.

SERUM FOR BLOOD POISONING

Reported Discovery of a Cure Sought by Medical Men for Five Hundred Years.

Dr. Julius I. Meltzer of the staff of the Rockefeller Institute, New York City, announces that a positive cure has been discovered by Dr. Paul Ehrlich, head of the Institute for Experimental Therapeutics of Frankfurt, Germany, for one of the most virulent forms of blood poisoning that is known to continue into the second and third generations, and for which a cure has been sought for more than 500 years. The serum has been used successfully in the Rockefeller Institute. Dr. Meltzer said today:

"The nearest cure that we could find was of a mercurial nature, and positive cures have never been known, but here comes a discovery where positive cures have been effected in one injection of the serum and a cure began inside of three hours and completed in fourteen days. And, most wonderful of all, not a single case has failed to respond to the treatment, and not once have ill effects been the result of the treatment."

"The name of this great discovery is diazotized solution, or No. '96,' meaning Dr. Ehrlich's 96th discovery. According to Dr. Meltzer a new disease was recently detected among the soldiers in the Philippines. Two of the men were brought to the Rockefeller Institute, where under the direction of Captain Henry J. Nichols experiments were made.

It was found that this disease has certain similar blood organism to the other disease for which the cure was designed. Tests were made by inoculating monkeys and rabbits and then treatment was given by the serum, a quantity of which Dr. Ehrlich had sent to the Institute. To the surprise of the scientists the animals thus treated entirely recovered.

"Dr. Ehrlich has given to the world remedies for sleeping sickness and for remittent fever. These were wonderful, but he did not stop there. About four years ago he realized he was on the right track," said Dr. Meltzer.

"The disease which the new serum cures is responsible for paresis, locomotor ataxia, valvular disease of the heart, etc. Instances are recorded where cases of long standing have been cured in two weeks. Three hours after the injection of the serum all the germs have been killed and driven out of the system and the sores have begun to heal immediately, and the patient has been completely cured in fourteen days. In no case has it been necessary to give more than one injection of the serum.

"The disease, which it will now be able to wipe out entirely, has been a scourge on the various nations for hundreds of years."—Cincinnati Enquirer.
