CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Schroeder Has Bill to Get Children Home Earlier.

To support the efforts that have been made by the juvenile court authorities to keep children out of the moving picture shows at night, Councilman Fred Schroeder introduced an ordinance at the meeting of the city council Tuesday night providing that no child amusement after 8:45 p. m.

"Setting the hour at 8:45 will give them a chance," said Mr. Schroeder, "to get home before curfew time and will aid the proprietors of the moving picture shows, which the children frequent in getting them cleared out before the whistle blows."

All of the moving picture show proprietors in the city were called before the judge of the juvenile court a year ago and warned that children were being influenced for evil by remaining at the theaters too late at night, but Mr. Schroeder thinks there is as much running about after curfew as ever.

The ordinance provides for a fine of from \$10 to \$50 for a first offense and a fine of \$100 and the revoking of the license for a second offense.
