#### Monument for Site of Lone Tree

Merrick County Will Mark Historic Spot on Old Oregon Trail With a Marble Shaft.

CENTRAL CITY, Neb., Nov. 13.—(Special)—in the early days of Merrick county, during the fifties, there stood on the north bank of the Platte river, aguth of what is now Central City, a sland dottonwood tree. This tree was close to the old Oregon trail, and for miles up and down the river there was not another tree to be found. Under Robert Maione Walks Into Hands of its spreading branches amigrant trains halted for rest to escape the heat of the day under its beneficient shade. It came to be known to the early travelers of the piains as the 'Lone Tree," and when a settlement aprung up here after the Union Pacific went through the town was first called "Lone Tree" after the lone cottonwood on the river's bank. Later the name of the town was changed to Central City, other trees were planted, finally big groves sprung up, and the lone tree no longer was a curiculty. Finalty its branches withered and its trunk rotted, and the old and ascribed his downfall to fast living. tree fell down, and the spot where it stood He seemed indifferent to his fate. was almost forgotten. 
