that Caused Death of Sister Louise

Case of Defendant, William Fleger, Concluded in Court at Ponca-Arguments Today.

PONCA, Neb., Dec. 9 .- (Special.) -- Wiliam Flege was cross-examined today in the cast in which he is defending himself on the charge of murdering his sister. Louise. Shortly before the state's lawyers took him in hand, he was asked if he shot his sister. "No, sir," he replied with a strong voice.

He was visibly affected when confronted The defense guments will be heard today.

When asked about the wounds on his sister's body when he first came to the body that night the defendant stated that he had told his brother, Fred, that Louise was shot. He told Ida Heinrichs and her brother that she was shot, and then coun sel asked him if he knew she was shot, and he answered positively, "Yes, sir."

He stated that he had not seen the re olver after 2 o'clock the night of the murder until 8 o'clock the next morning, and vet insister that he had given it to Mr. Kingsbury, county attorney of Dixon county. The defendant was on the stand nine hours.


