ing Problem. That the tariff is not the cause of the high cost of living and that the condi tions which have brought about the high cost of living are not to be bettered by a revision of the tariff, is the belief of Gus Hyman, part owner of one of the largest cotton goods houses of New York, who

was at the Rome hotel Saturday "I believe," said Hyman, "that the only way to loosen up the money market and to reduce the cost of living is to subsidize the farmer. I do not know whether or not that is constitutional, but if some such inducement could be made by the government to get the people to leave the cities and go to the farms, then we would have great increase in production and naturally a great decrease in the cost of living. What we need is more farms. We are not producing enough. When the tariff was passed during McKinley's administration we were talking of the rich laboring man and the poor farmer. Now it has reversed. When the farmer gets money he buys more land; the more land he gets the less inclined is he to produce any more than what will make him a good living. We need more competition in farm-
