NEW CASE ASSIGNING SYSTEM

District Court Judges to Try a New Scheme in February.

CASES IN GROUPS OF THREE

As soon as a case is disposed of on a docket another is to be substituted to take its place.

Revision of the case assigning system in the district court which is expected to result in smoother operation of the courts and in less waste of time has been made by the judges and will be placed in effect at the beginning of the February term.

At the beginning of the term the presiding judge in courtroom No. 1 will call the entire docket of all the cases at issue, that is ready for trial, and a certain number of cases will be assigned for trial during each day of the term. Cases not at issue will be sent to the head of the docket.

Cases then will be assigned for trial in groups of three to the several courtrooms. As rapidly as disposition is made of a case the next that is open is referred to the presiding judge in courtroom No. 1, but it frequently happens that the attorneys in so other cases are ready to step in and begin trial, the result being that the court must wait until the following day, losing from a half day to a day's time. Under the new plan the parties and attorneys in waiting cases will have some general idea of when their cases can be tried and will hold themselves ready to come in.

The system now in vogue has proven unsatisfactory. The new plan is one which for some time the members of the bar have wanted tried.

The change in method of assignment has necessitated a change in the time for empaneling the petit jury. Heretofore the jury has been empaneled and other business incident to the opening of a term of court has been done on the first day of the term. Under the new plan these matters will be attended to on the third day of the term. The first and second days being required in the calling of the docket and the assignment of cases by days.

At the opening of the February term, February 2, there will be some 300 cases for assignment.

MONTANA AT THE LAND SHOW

Newly Developed Country to Make a Strong Showing.

EXHIBITS ARE BEING GATHERED

Railroads Are Helping to Collect the Exhibits to Show Resources of the New Country at Omaha Exposition.

That the new country tapped a year ago by the Burlington in Montana is to make a most creditable exhibit at the land show in Omaha. It is shown by the following clipping from the Great Falls Leader of Great Falls, Mont.:

"Exhibits are now being gathered by Secretary Holmes, of the Board of Commerce for the Western Lands-Products show to be held in Omaha from January 19 to 23, inclusive. For this show the city of Great Falls will have thirty feet frontage to display samples of the soil, mineral and machine products of this section. The state of Montana will be represented by an immense exhibit. The Great Northern railroad will devote about fifty feet to Montana exhibits, while some eight or ten other cities and sections of the state have engaged spaces similar to that of Great Falls. The show is devoted entirely to the exhibitions of the states of the north-west and it is certain that Montana's showing will not be surpassed by its sister states.

"The Boston and Montana smelter here is collecting material for a big mineral display to be made in connection with the Board of Commerce agricultural exhibit. This is to be the only mineral display in the exhibit building and will be accorded a special place of honor if it is desired. The Omaha Bee people, who are conducting the show in co-operation with the railroad, have assured Secretary Holmes that a mineral display would be most acceptable and that one is furnished from this city they will be glad to give it special space.

Minerals to Be Shown.

In addition to the minerals which the Boston & Montana smelter proposes to show at Omaha some samples of various mineral deposits in this county will be exhibited by the Board of Commerce. Secretary Holmes has made arrangements for securing samples of Cascade county oval, lime and argillaceous as well as other minerals and these, too, will be installed with the exhibit. It is probable that the mineral features of the Great Falls exhibit will give it a distinctive character, which will make it prominent among hundreds of exhibits.

"The agricultural resources of the county will be well represented. The Board of Commerce has stored away a vast amount of grain, grass, fruit and seed samples which will be used in making the exhibit. These samples were used in the various fair exhibits last fall and are of a high quality.

"W. V. Talbot, the well known rancher, who is among the more advanced farmers of the county, also has a large collection of samples of products of his farm. These he has offered to the Board of Commerce for exhibition purposes. The offer has been accepted and Mr. Talbot will accompany these samples to Great Falls.

"All the exhibit material will be gathered in this city and loaded on a car here. The railroad will transport the exhibit to Omaha free of charge. It is expected that it will take several cars to carry the Montana exhibits to Omaha."

Sailor Boys Wanted for a Bigger Navy

Navy to Be Filled to the Full Complement by the First of July.

The Navy department at Washington has sent out announcements that an effort will be made to fill the enlisted complement of the navy, \$2,000 men, by July 1.

The announcement says that the foreign cruises of the Atlantic fleet are to be continued, and all young men who enlist this winter will in all probability finish their course of instruction in time to be detailed on one of these cruises.

Sixteen battalions of the Atlantic fleet are now returning from Europe, where they have been visiting for the last two months the ports of England and France. On its return the fleet will stop at Guantanamo, Cuba, where the spring rifle practice will begin January 11.

Shultz Says Jury Was "Fixed" in Trial

Man Convicted for Death of William Krug Accuses Foreman of Jury.

Charges that the district court jury which found him guilty of manslaughter, but commended him to the leniency of the court, was "fixed" were made in the very face of G. R. Grant, foreman of the jury, by Alex Shultz when the two met in a clear store shortly after Shultz was released from the county jail on a \$5,000 court appeal bond, according to Mr. Grant. Shultz's attack, made in the presence of several witnesses, was emphasized with interjections, said Mr. Grant and others who witnessed it. Shultz said he simply was radduced to the penitentiary; that if he had had a fair jury he would not be in trouble. Mr. Grant said he has not decided whether or not he will report the matter to Judge Estelle of the criminal court, before whom the Shultz case was tried. If the matter officially is brought to the attention of the court, an action for contempt of court might be started against Shultz.

Creamery Company Gets New Permit

Will Rebuild Its Plant at Once—To Cost Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Permit for the erection of a new plant by the Fairmont Creamery company at the site of the structure recently burned was issued at the office of the business inspector Friday afternoon. The new plant will cost \$100,000.

Part of the walls of the building destroyed by fire will be utilized in the construction of the new plant. The building will be six stories in height and of fire-proof construction. The frame will be of steel, with below the walls and partitions.
