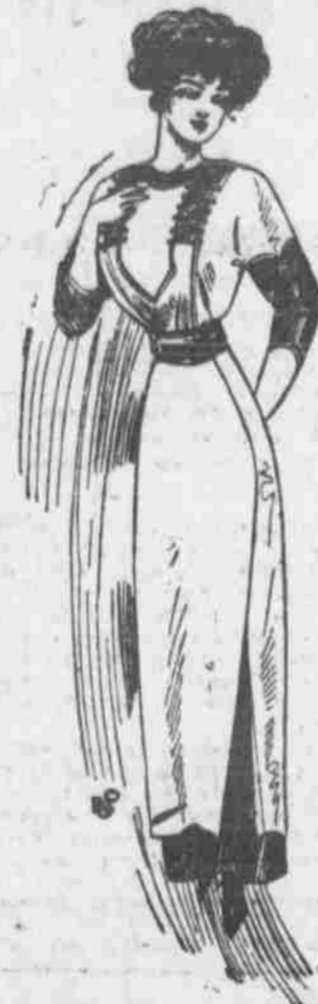

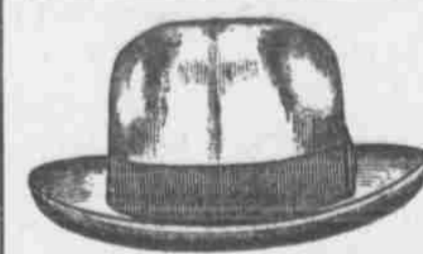

FRATERNAL AND OTHER ADDRESSES. By Morris Sheppard. 80 Pp. The Beacon Press.
The author of this book is the sovereign banker of the Woodmen of the World and Congressman from Texas, and dedicates the work to Joseph Cullen Root, in a very complimentary paragraph.
This volume is made up of two scores addresses delivered by Mr. Sheppard, or extracts from these addresses. They cover a somewhat wide field, but the majority deal with the different phases of fraternalism, especially as exemplified by the tenets and practices of the Woodmen of the World, the great order which was founded in Omaha and has its headquarters here.
Research and study are indicated in many of the addresses, and a high-pitched strain of eloquence pervades them all. The author has drawn on history, ancient and modern, in its most picturesque and striking phases, and has gathered many beautiful and edifying pictures and uplifting examples, which he has elaborated in good, strong English. Those of the addresses devoted to departed members of the order are filled with a touching elevation of thought that gives them a value much beyond the ordinary such effusions, and there is apparent throughout a flavor of deep sincerity, of optimism and of unquestioning faith. That Mr. Sheppard is equipped with a mind and heart keenly susceptible to the touch of nature that makes all men kin is amply testified by his speeches as set forth in this book.
Outside the fraternal field there are cogent and clever addresses on Abraham Lincoln, delivered before a republican club in New York, on books on Christian citizenship, on historical characters and significant epochs of the history of various states.
"God We Trust" is an address worthy of very kind mention, and a particularly strong expression of the liberal and scholarly trend of the author's mind is to be found in "Contributions of the Hebrew People to Human Advancement." It is

one of the best short epitomes of the subject to be found anywhere.
Altogether, Mr. Sheppard has put before his fraternal brothers a most acceptable and uplifting volume, and the general public will find in it many things of genuine merit touching the common affairs of life and the value of the life of the common man to the family, the community and the nation.
"EDUCATION IN SEXUAL PHYSIOLOGY." By Dr. Philip Zenger.
A real act of social service was accomplished by Dr. Philip Zenger of the University of Cincinnati when he wrote "Education in Sexual Physiology and Hygiene." It tells in a simple, clean manner what parents and teachers have long felt ought to be a matter of common knowledge for the young. And it is told after a fashion which will be eagerly sought by these same teachers and parents as a model. It is a matter of sorrow that this book was not written and widely distributed sooner, since by so doing much trouble, morally and physically, might have been avoided. It is a matter of social congratulation that it is now written, that it may serve for the amelioration of these and kindred troubles in the future. Every teacher, every parent, every laborer in the vineyard of moral juvenile growth will find a genuine delight in spreading the news of this book. It is hoped that its ready acceptance by the public inspires the author to write more of his kind.
IN AFRICA. By John T. McCutcheon. 40 Pp. E. B. Bobb-Merrill company.
Mr. McCutcheon's book on Africa is at once unique and delightful. It differs at the start from all other books on the subject in that it conveys a great amount of fresh and most interesting information, and at the same time brims with delicious humor. Illustrated with drawings by the author and 125 photographs.
SPEECHES IN STIRRING TIMES. By Richard Henry Dana, Jr. 80 Pp. E. B. Bobb-Merrill company.
There have been few more interesting Americans than Richard H. Dana, Jr., the author of the classic, "Two Years Before

the Mast," and later one of the most distinguished lawyers and publicists of his time. His speeches, of which the most notable have been collected in the present book, are masterpieces of vigorous, lucid exposition and argument. They treat many subjects, such as "The Monroe Doctrine," "The Fugitive Slave Law," "The Free Soil Movement," "The Case of Bible in Public Schools," "The Halifax Fisheries," etc.
BOHEMIA AND THE CECHS. By Will S. Monroe. 44 Pp. L. C. Page & Co.
The author gives a general survey of the people of Bohemia, their social and political institutions and economic and industrial conditions. The book tells of the beginnings of the Bohemian nation, the end of Bohemian independence and the centuries of misfortune and oppression which followed this calamity. The volume is attractively illustrated and contains a map.
WORKINGMAN'S INSURANCE IN EUROPE. By Lee K. Frankel and Miles H. Dawson. 62 Pp. \$2.50. Charities Publication Committee.
This volume presents the results of a careful investigation, covering about six months of the systems of insuring workmen in operation in European countries. It gives in fuller detail than has been done heretofore in this country the various kinds of European insurance, their methods of operation, their finances and relations with governments.
Text Books.
THE STORY OF OLD FRANCE. By H. A. Guerber. 24 Pp. 5c. American Book Company.
The story of France from the earliest times down to the death of Louis XIV, laying stress upon the many interesting and picturesque episodes in which the period abounds, as they are presented in literature and art. The book is supplied with maps and illustrations.
STORIES OF THE KING. By James Baldwin. 35 Pp. 5c. American Book Company.
The stories form a complete connected narrative, relating all the most notable

and most pleasing legends, as told by romancers of many times and many lands. They are here presented in single, modern English, and care has been taken to avoid everything that might give offense to anyone.
JOAN OF ARC—FRENCH COMPOSITION. By H. A. Guerber. 38 Pp. 30 cents. American Book Company.
The present account of the life and exploits of Joan of Arc is written in an agreeable style, adapted to the purpose in view; and is provided with foot notes indicating by rearrangement of the English words the equivalent French construction.
SPEAKING AND WRITING—BOOK TWO. By William H. Maxwell, Emma L. Johnston and Madriena D. Barnum. 128 Pp. 25 cents. American Book Company.
This book provided instruction in oral and written language for the fourth year. Careful attention is given to the requirements for correct pronunciation and enunciation, as well as to spelling and punctuation.
NATURE STUDY FOR HIGHER GRAMMAR GRADES. By Horace H. Cummings. 74 Pp. 75 cents. American Book Company.
The subjects treated cover a wide range of observation and experience, and an effort is made to develop the uses and methods of classifying knowledge. Light, best, sound, electricity, gravity, friction, etc., are studied, not only that the pupil may understand their laws and relations, but that he may appreciate their beauty and use.
LANGUAGE SERIES—BOOK ONE. By Robert D. Metcalf and Augustine L. Rafter. 35 Pp. 40 cents. American Book Company.
This book develops a plan for a careful study of familiar objects. Lessons on subjects suitable to the pupil's understanding are supplied in the form of pictures, such natural objects as can be obtained easily, and interesting stories and poems.
LANGUAGE SERIES BOOK TWO. By Robert C. Metcalf and Augustine L. Rafter. 36 Pp. 50 cents. American Book Company.
This book, based upon the new course of

English adopted by the schools of Boston, is designed for the higher grades of elementary schools. Original exercises by the pupils are called for, and many selections from standard authors serve as guides to the appreciation of literature.
ERNEST AND HEITERER. By Josefa Schranz. 32 Pp. 40 cents. American Book Company.
A collection of short stories for the first and second years of German. These stories are selected from the works of modern writers.
HISTORICAL FRENCH READER. By Felix Well. 128 Pp. 40 cents. American Book Company.
Thirty selections for second year reading. The original text has been preserved as far as possible; but the abridgment of the Chanson de Roland and the selection from Froissart have been shortened.
EASY STANDARD FRENCH. By Victor Franck. 122 Pp. 40 cents. American Book Company.
Thirty stories, for second year reading, each complete in itself and prefaced by a short biography of the author. The selections, typical of the best French prose, are grouped by centuries.
STEPHEN OF PHILADELPHIA. By James Otis. 166 Pp. 35 cents. American Book Company.
The Quaker boy Stephen comes over from England in the good ship "John and Sarah," as he tells us, and helps his father build the family home in the new land. The book, which is intended for supplementary reading in the third, fourth and fifth years, is sure to interest children.
NATURAL LAWS IN PIANO TECHNIC. By Mary Wood Chase. 122 Pp. \$1.25. Oliver Ditson Company.
This work presents the essential laws of the building up of a good piano technic in a practical manner.
WHAT TO DO AT RECESS. By George E. Johnson. 32 Pp. 25 cents. Ginn & Co.
The book considers in turn the needs of the primary, the intermediate and the

grammar school children, both boys and girls. It is easy to read, very suggestive and deals with essentials.
PETER OF NE WAMSTERDAM. By James Otis. 158 Pp. 35 cents. American Book Company.
Peter tells how he, a 10-year-old lad, came to take the long voyage from Holland to New Amsterdam, and how he began his new life in the odd little village. The book is illustrated, and is sure to make history more attractive to the average boy and girl.
CALVERT OF MARYLAND. By James Otis. 128 Pp. 35 cents. American Book Company.
This story of Lord Baltimore's colony is told in the words of a lad who sailed with the first colonists in the good ship Ark and shared their stormy voyage to the new home in Chesapeake Bay. The book, intended for supplementary reading in the third and fourth years, is illustrated from pen and ink drawings.
CHRISTMAS CAROLS AND HYMNS. By Hollis Dann. 122 Pp. 40 cents. American Book Company.
In this book the author has brought together the standard Christmas anthems, as well as the best Christmas hymns, and the most beautiful and attractive Christmas chorals. It is intended for use not only in schools, but also for Christmas entertainment by church choirs.
THE LOUIRA ALCOOTT STORY BOOK. Edited by Fanny E. Coe. 122 Pp. 50 cents. Little, Brown & Co.
The selections for this book have been made from "Little Men" and other best known books by Miss Alcott with a view to furnishing schools a supplementary reader. The stories appeal to boys and girls in equal measure.
