

Southern Three-I Leaguers Say Base Ball Must Be Run by Ball Men, Not Courts

THREE-I LEAGUE UP IN AIR Southern Members Refuse to Attend Meeting in Chicago.

TWO COMPROMISES SUGGESTED President Kearney Finds Himself Alone with Clubs He Has Been Opposing in the Courts.

CHICAGO, March 15.—Refusal of the southern clubs of the Three-I league to join the northern members at the proposed "love feast" today prevented the attendance of a meeting and made it impossible to adopt a playing schedule or to transact any other business.

President R. F. Kinnealy of the Springfield club, in a sharp message to President Kearney, denounced the meeting, refused to attend and said he believed none of the other clubs would be present.

The telegram read: "A. L. Kearney will not agree to attend a meeting of the Three-I league with the intention of effecting a compromise. All clubs receiving protection should come with clean hands. Believe I am expressing sentiment of every honest club that reserves protection from an American association."

Kearney Explains Position. Representatives of the four northern clubs—Waterloo, Dubuque, Davenport and Rock Island—were on hand as was President Kearney, who then found himself alone with the clubs he had been opposing in the courts.

Two Compromises Suggested. After President Kearney announced that no meeting would be held, H. L. Lane of the Davenport club and J. J. Martins, representing Waterloo, arranged to hold a conference with Kearney.

It is said efforts will be made to have a representative of one of the southern clubs attend a meeting to be held tomorrow so official action can be taken.

At the close of the conference, the two club owners bore to their fellow northern members two propositions suggested by President Kearney.

1. Formation of a ten-club league for this year, all franchises to be abandoned at the close of the season and the league to include and include the present membership, Decatur and Quincy.

2. Dividing into two six-club leagues to be made up of (a) the southern clubs with Quincy and Decatur and (b) the northern clubs with Cedar Rapids and Clinton, Ia.

Los Angeles Jury Reports. Coronor's Panel Says Times Explosion Was Caused by Explosive Other Than Illuminating Gas.

LOS ANGELES, March 15.—The coroner's jury in the Times disaster of October 1, after an adjournment of several weeks, held its concluding session and returned the following verdict.

The Times building was destroyed and a great number of the employees killed by an explosion, followed by fire, said explosion being caused by high explosives other than illuminating gas, placed there by a party or parties unknown to this jury.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS Paving Bids for Seventeen Streets Show Lower Figures.

ASPHALT FIGURES MUCH REDUCED High Murphy Bids in Some Instances Twenty-Five Cents a Square Below Week Ago—Connell Gets Auto.

Prices on asphalt pavement went glimmering Tuesday when the city council opened bids for the paving of seventeen streets. Michael Ford, who swept the board last week, was whipsawed right and left by Hugh Murphy and the Bryant & McLaughlin company, who submitted low bids for this particular kind of material.

In some instances Murphy bid 25 cents lower per square yard than he did a week ago, when he failed to get in the money. Murphy's estimates last night ran in the neighborhood of \$180 a square. One week ago, Ford cleaned the platter with bids which averaged in the neighborhood of \$190 a square.

The recommendation of the city engineer's department for tabulation of the bids received on the bids received one week ago was accepted.

Bids for the paving of Davenport street from Ninth street to Thirteenth street and Chicago street from Ninth to Eleventh street were referred to the committee of the whole.

Ask Lighting Bids. A resolution asking for bids for lighting this streets with gas was passed by the council.

Emergency Hospital. The County Board of Commissioners, through a communication, offered to donate the site for an emergency hospital for the city and to furnish all help and supplies if the city will erect the building.
