NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS Apparticum Agriculture

Parallel for Extreme Dullness Only in Nineteen-Four.

MERCANTILE LIQUIDATION PLAIN Advices from the More Important Industrial Centers Denote Caution Shown by the Large Jobbers and Distributors.

NEW YORK, March 26.—To find a parallel for the extreme dullness of the stock market last week, it is necessary to go back to March 1994, when speculation was reduced to a minimum while the market cantal the decision in the Northern Securities case. Never since that time has trading fallen to a daily average in the heighborhood of 190,000 shares.

Various facts and figures at hand confirm the fass increasing impression that the country is now undergoing slow but certain mercantile liquidation. This is apparent in all sections except the south, where business in many lines shows little diminuition. Advices from the more important industrial centers, especially in regard to textiles, denote the caution shown by large joubers and distributors, while the last fortnight has wanessed a failing off in steel and from Other evidence of the movement in almost all branches of trade is found in the steady decline in bank clearings throughout almost the entire country.
