Iowa Republicans Who Enter Conference Make Him Choice to Succeed Dolliver.

DES MOINES, Ia., March 30,-At a caucus of sixty out of the 104 republican members of the Iowa legislature tonight, Judge W. S. Kenyon was nominated as the republican party candidate for United States senator to succeed Senator Dolliver. Of the forty-four absentees fifteen have voted for Kenyon hitherto. Sixty-four

nembers signed the caucus call, but the
