ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 8.—(Special Telegram)—For the third straight time Pa Rourke's athletes were defeated in a pitchers' battle here today. Chellette, a recruit from the Texas league, outpitched Danny Dremser Durbin in one of the best contests played in this city this season. The final count was 1 to 1.

Chellette allowed only five hits while Durbin was bumped for eight. Errors were really responsible for Omaha's defeat. In the eighth inning, with the score standing a tie, 1 to 1, Schoonover and Schipke made errors that were responsible for the runs that gave St. Joe the game. The first man up, Kelly, hit a long fly to Schoonover, who dropped it, letting Kelly go to second. Powell then bunted to Schipke, who threw the ball over Kane's head, Kelly and Powell going to third. Powell scored on Kelly's long fly.

Frank, Anderson, Hiltner, Bates and Ankeny Are the Successful Candidates.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 8.—(Special Telegram)—Owen Frank, the gridiron star; Louis Anderson, a long distance runner; Arthur Hiltner, center on the varsity basketball team; W. O. Bates, a cross-country man and W. E. Ankeny, a triathlete, were the successful candidates at the athletic board election held Monday at the state university.

The election passed without the slightest excitement, the usual fight on Theta Nu Epsilon playing little figure in the result. Charges of T. N. E. affiliations were dropped against four of the candidates, but played but little figure in the general result and were generally discredited by the students. Dr. Clapp caused some excitement early Monday morning by attempting to force students to vote for five men on the tickets in some instances the voters were voting for only three and four of the eleven candidates and the secretary attempted to throw these ballots out. He was immediately opposed in the movement, however, and an examination of the records showed that a voter might cast his ballot for any number of candidates so that he did not vote for more than five.

QUINCY BUYS BLOOMINGTON FRANCHISE AND SEASON'S PLAY WILL BEGIN WEDNESDAY.

CHICAGO, May 8.—President Al Terney of the Three-I league announced today that all troubles of his association had come to an end at last and that play would begin Wednesday with Quincy playing in the place of Bloomington, having bought that club's franchise today.

The announcement was made by President Terney in a meeting held at Quincy. Quincy had withdrawn its injunction suit and, having options on the franchises of several of the southern clubs, it sent representatives to the meeting today authorized to buy its way into the league. Bloomington accepted the terms offered by Quincy, which were not made public, and dropped out of the Three-I. Announcement of its future was made by Bloomington's delegation. President Terney was much elated over the outcome, as it relieved the league of the loss of \$2500 paid by Quincy to enter the organization and it also shunted off the payment of \$10000 to that club because of its failure to get in after it had been given to understand such a procedure could be arranged. The complete schedule of the season's games will not be published for several days, but the club representatives expected to decide on the first ten games today. The players of the Bloomington club were distributed as follows: Royer, Prendergast, Goodwin and Manion to Springfield, Davidson to Peoria, Kennedy and Jackson to Waterloo, Melchior and Murdoch to Dubuque, Irwin to Rock Island, Hummel to Danvers, and Battersie to Bloomington was given \$2500 for the franchise of the Bloomington base ball company, \$2000 to be divided among the clubs of the league and \$500 to be paid by Harry Hofer of Quincy, who gets the franchise.

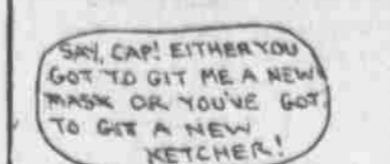

Colorado-Yule marble instead of the blue-veined Italian will be the marble used on the new court house. After two months of bucking and shoving on the proposition of changing the contract in favor of the home product, the Board of County Commissioners took a final deciding vote in favor of the change yesterday afternoon, instructing the county attorney to draw up the papers necessary for the change. John C. Lynch and Peter Elasser, commissioners, have fought the change since the matter was brought before the board by the contractor. Their grounds have been that it would be dangerous to change the contract, although they did not object particularly to the Colorado marble. Commissioner Lynch voted against the resolution yesterday. Commissioner Elasser was absent. The rest of the board voted for the change, saying that they had received enough assurance from public bodies to justify them in doing so. Letters favorable to the Colorado-Yule company from the architects on the \$1,000,000 court house at Cleveland, O., and the million dollar courthouse at Johnston, O., were brought before the board. J. P. Manning, general manager of the Colorado-Yule Marble company, was present and urged the fact that their marble is being used in the new Union Pacific building here and the Woodmen of the World building.

Suit Filed Against Alleged Gamblers

Mrs. Wilford C. Bayne of Arkansas Seeks to Recover Money She Says Her Husband Lost.

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., May 8.—(Special)—Suit has been filed in the district court for the recovery of \$2500, alleged to have been lost by the husband of the plaintiff, in gambling, at a place where it was claimed was conducted by William L. Bowman, Harvey Thompson and Hal C. Roll. In this city, during the months of September, October and November, 1910, the plaintiff is Mrs. Wilford C.
