CONFIDENT TONE IN GENERAL

Hill Stocks Are Again Strong and Active-Trading Indicates that Sentiment Has Become More Cheerful,

There was much nervous activity in wheat with July shorts ultimately scampering to cover, and with long releasing profits. Foar of manipulation explained to some extent the erratic course of prices for deferred deliveries. The Hessian fly reports, which received rather serious attention, came chiefly from Indiana and the western part of central Illinois. Minnesota fursished the excitement about the grasshoppers. As for heat damage, millers advices iended to show an unexpected reduction of conditions throughout Kansas and Okiahoma during May. Incidentally the bulls were helped by the fact that cash wheat was relatively firmer than futures, July ranged from 90% to 12502%, and closed easy at 21% a net gain of ½c.

Crop reports regarding corn were exceptionally good. Price changes for July varied from 3% to 54% with last sales ¼6% down at 55% 353 kc. Cash sales were steady in the main, but undesirable lots declined less to 3 variety closed at 1456 48%.
