Sentiment Prevails that Weather Conditions Are Discouraged.

WHEAT PERFECT IN NORTHWEST

Heavy Situation in Cash Corn, Which is Being Offset by Continuation of Dry Weather Despite Temperatures.

OMAHA, June 13, 1911.

Whether or not the cash wheat hedging is complete is the feature that is worrying the wheat trader. The sentiment prevailing is that the improved weather conditions have been discouraged and prices should react from the recent sharp decline.

The northwest situation is at a climax of perfect condition and any change would naturally be unfavorable to the final crop outcome and help advance the market.

NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Bears Make Determined Effort to Demonstrate Their Strength.

DOWNWARD MOVEMENT CHECKED

Tone Becomes Firmer and Stocks Gradually Make Up Losses—Speculative Finish, with Good Fractional Gains.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A determined effort was made today to demonstrate the strength of the bear position in the stock market, and speculative issues, especially United States Steel, were subjected to heavy pressure.

Prices declined rapidly during the early part of the day and the movement was accelerated by the circulation of various disquieting reports, but the downward movement was checked almost before the day's trading was fairly under way, and a recovery set in.

The tone became firmer and stocks gradually made up the losses. The speculative market, however, closed yesterday's closing prices on the rebound, and the day's trading with good fractional gains.

The copper market was the most prominent and about duplicated yesterday's rise of a point or more. The buying movement in these stocks was based primarily on the improvement in the copper metal market, but it was regarded as probable that the movement was largely speculative.

One of the few noteworthy events of the day was the suspension of dividends on Denver & Rio Grande preferred, which had been paid 5 per cent basis since 1907. The action of the board of directors, however, was not surprising as the course of the stock during the last few years has been so erratic that such an event it was accepted as an indication that the Gould interests have renounced on a policy of extreme conservatism.

Bonds were easier. Total sales, par value, \$3,000,000. The 3 1/2 per cent U. S. 5s declined 1/8 on call.
