Thirty-Five Thousand Youths From All Parts of United Kingdom and Colonies Greet Monarch.


WINDSOR, England, July 5.-King George accompanied by Queen Mary and surrounded by a brilliant staff of distinguished officers of the navy and with other members of the royal family re-viewed in Windsor park today an army of 55,000 boy scouts gathered from all parts of the United Kingdom and from some of the colonies.
