GOOD HEARS FROM BOND FIRM

City Clerk Receives Word that Histories Have Been Found in Office at Toledo—Colonel Dickey Visits.

John Hughes, pioneer citizen and veteran stockman, was thrown from his buggy and painfully injured Thursday afternoon at Twenty-fourth and Q streets.

How Colonel Dickey Lives. If you want to be 82 years young, like Colonel James Dickey of St. Joseph, Mo., don't smoke or drink and keep a grocery at the cross roads near Mt. Pleasant, Ia.

The colonel is 82 years of age and looks 60. He is hale and hearty and enjoys to the full the days of his life.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW

Relatively Liberal Volume of Road Sales During Week. NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Bradstreet's today says: Though a relatively liberal volume of road sales came out this week, the probabilities are that trade as a whole has receded a little from last week.

The situation in iron and steel is still marked by irregularity, and there has been a sharp falling off in the volume of business since August. Orders being placed, however, are expanding, especially in iron pipe, while the railroads are buying rails more freely.

There is little more inquiry for pig iron and capacity is slightly larger, especially with merchant furnaces. Bessemer iron is nominally quoted at \$13.50, while cast iron is reported at \$12.50, valley. Basic is currently quoted at \$12.00, valley. The demand for plates is much under capacity. In all finished lines concessions are obtainable for desirable business.

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The developments of the week show that staple articles continue in comparatively good demand. As it is satisfactory orders are noted for most lines of dry goods, shoe, clothing, hardware, grocery and kindred lines, though purchases of cotton goods are being made along conservative lines, primarily because of the recussions in raw cotton prices.

Leather is firmer, while hides are higher and eastern shoe manufacturers report encouraging orders from western buyers, while western trade in the latter has been helped by wet weather.

Corn exports for the week were 1,117,000 bushels, against 1,077,000 bushels last week and 65,200 bushels in 1910. For the fourteen weeks ending October 5 corn exports were 8,019,834 bushels, against 4,911,622 bushels last year.

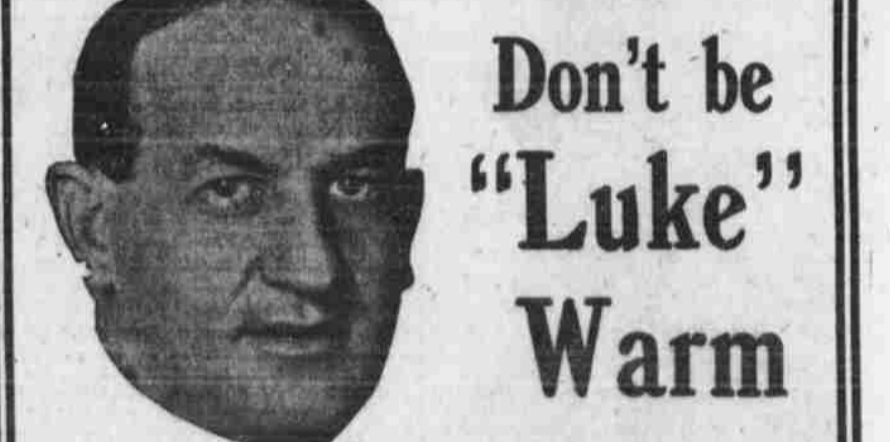
