BEWARE THE SILENT SPOTTER

Remarkable New Invention that Has Assisted in Recent Sensational Cases. The true these sullen walls should field so echo, but walls have ears—nay, more, they have tongues. Byron, when he put these words into the mouth of the Duke of Venice, in his play, "Marino Falieri," had never heard of the dictograph; neither had he. If the Dukes had been familiar with the famous "Council of Ten" words have been a far more ferocious

and fear-inspiring body than it was. But even if they had no dictographs, they had the idea. They fixed up all sorts of cunning traps for the aid of the gentle art of eavesdropping. It remained, however, for modern science, aided by the constant efforts of years of one man, who and only his brains and his energy to aid him in his race to an inventor, to work out the wonderful little instrument which has had such a tremendous influence in public and private affairs in the last year or so. K. M. Turner, formerly of Terre Haute, Ind., now living at Jamaica, L. I., is the inventor. The contrivance is so small it is capable of concealment in ways that laugh at detection, and with its aid even a dullard can make the achievements of Sherlock Holmes, or Lupin, the pattern from which he was drawn, look innocent. For Lupin and Holmes had to reach their conclusions by deduction, wherein there was the possibility of error. The dictograph gives results direct. But the dictograph cannot be described by comparison with any human trait or quality, for its powers seem superhuman. Every uttered word, even when spoken in a whisper by one within range of its transmitter, is carried infallibly to its receiver may be at the other end of the

wire leading from it. It has been used to gain evidence in a conspicuous divorce case; it has been used to make legislative grafters convict themselves; it has aided upon the mayor of Gary, Ind., in a little side enterprise for which he was put under indictment; it gave up revelations in the Illinois Central grafting cases so conclusive that in ten minutes the tools fastened around the suspected ones, and it gave an unsuspected ear to the wives of election workers who sought, by bribery, to keep Louisville negroes from the polls. Its adaptability to scientific study has been recognized by the volcanologist and seismic expert, Prof. Perret, who predicted the Messina earthquake to the day. Mr. Turner is now hard at work trying to have the machine register the sound of the heartbeat. This sound is peculiar, inasmuch as it does not lend itself to transmission. The idea is, of course, that in a clinical operation the operating surgeon and all the medical students viewing the operation, by having connected car pieces attached to the transmitter, can hear the beat of the patient's heart and thereby know his actual condition at every stage of his ordeal. But the experiments thus far have not been satisfactory. The mass of flesh between the heart and skin is not sensitive enough of vibration to carry the sound to the wil-

ling ears of the dictograph. The dictograph has been famous so far only as a detective. Its use in the boodie cases in Columbus and Indiana by Detective Burns first brought the attention of the world at large to the fact there was such a machine.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.
