OYSTER BAY, N. Y., March H .- Theo dore Roosevelt tonight finished the space which he is to open his campaign at Cambridge hall, New York, before the Civic forum next Wednesday night. In it Colonel Roosevelt will take up the general subject of the control of governmental agencies by the people and outline what he considers the chief issue of the campaign. It is expected that his speech will constitute the roply which he said last week he would make sident Taft's address in Toledo.

siderable effect. In the morning Colonel Roosevelt will make what he hopes will be his last trip to Mineola for jury duty. Having during the last two weeks, he said he thought he had done his part and hoped to be excused if his services were not required temorrow.

Davis to Assist Dixon. WASHINGTON, March 14.-Owar King Davis, head of the Washington bureau of the New York Times, will be general publicity man and assistant to Sepator Dixon in the Roosevelt headquarters, it was announced today by Senator Dixon. Mr. Davis, it was said, is to be more than head of the literary bureau of the national headquarters; he is to be a working assistant to Senator Dixon and "sort of an assistant general manager" in the words of the Recevelt campaign director. A further announcement of the selection of a well known middlewest man to take active control of some of the western work in the head quarters, is expected within a day or two

The new Roosevelt publicity expert has been for several years a Washington correspondent and represented a New York paper in Manila during part of Mr Taft's service there as military governor. He wrote a campaign book on "Taft, the Man of the Hour," during the last presidential campaign; and has been an in-timate friend of both Colonel Roosevelt and President Taft.

The Roosevelt headquarters today gav out a statement prepared at a conference of negro ministers in Washington claim ing to represent 400,000 negro voters de-claring for Roosevelt as the "friend of the negroes." The statement is by Bishops J. S. Caldwell, Philade The statement is signed A. J. Warner, Tennessee; G. L. Black well. Indianapolis; E. Tyres, Nashville, and G. W. Clinton of Charlotte, N. C., and by more than thirty negroes from various cities.
