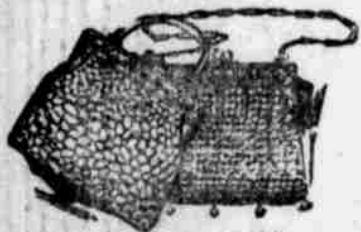

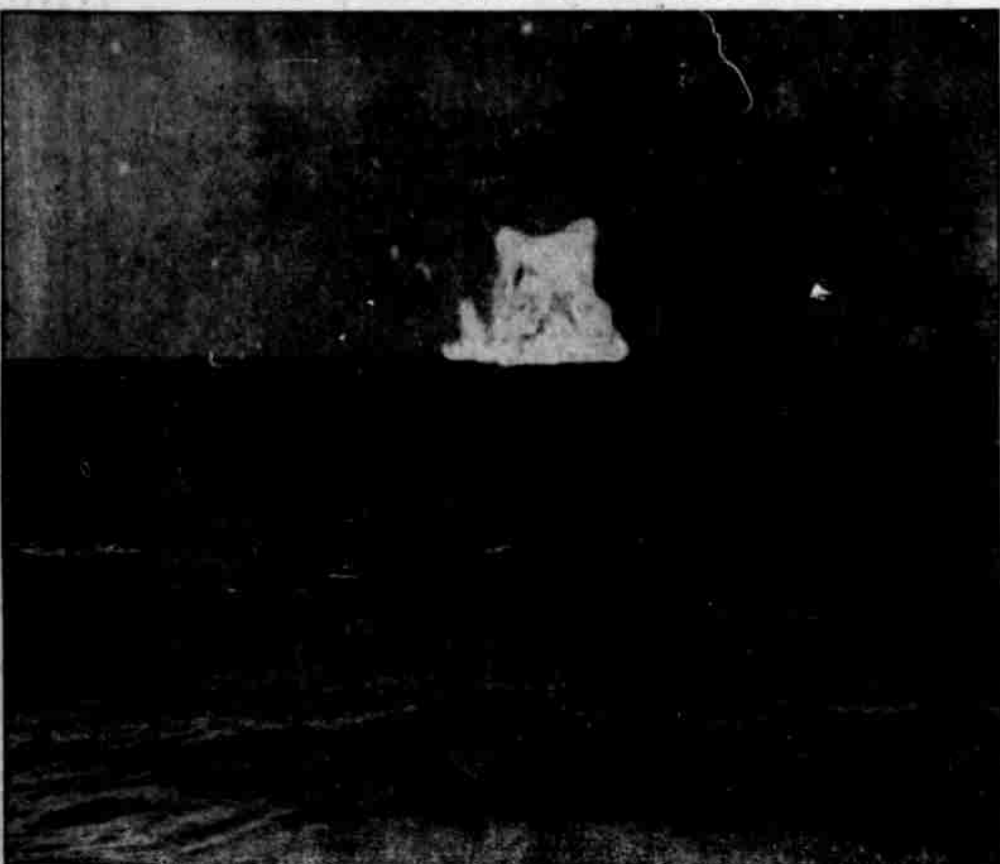

**Omaha Woman Has Iceberg Experience**

Mrs. M. E. Chapman of 329 Burt street, Omaha, has had the very unusual experience of having been on board a steamship when it was in collision with a monster iceberg. It happened in the summer of 1909 when she was on the Canadian Pacific's great boat, the Empress of Britain, eastbound. The vessel collided with an iceberg in the middle of the night, just before clearing the Gair of St. Lawrence. The next day some of the passengers made photographs of the great mass of ice, one of which Mrs. Chapman furnishes The Bee, and which is reproduced herewith. Mrs. Chapman tells the story of the dangerous experience thus:

"I remember perfectly how it sounded to me. I thought somebody's foot had come in contact with my berth. The scene was one to be always remembered. The women staid around the bedroom stow-

ard's neck, and bore him down. Even when the captain dispatched the ship's officers around with reassuring words it was of no avail. Not until the sound of hammering was heard were the passengers satisfied that we were not going down. There was a vast deal of difference between the accident to the Titanic and the one I speak of. The Empress suffered only a slightly damaged prow and broken propeller. After laying to for six hours to repair the damage, we proceeded on our way, not before several gentlemen among the passengers had photographed the cause of our fears which we saw near noon at a safe distance, a huge iceberg, looking like a skyscraper at long range.
