FIELD CAMPAIGN IS ORDERED Unted States Army and Guards Will Watch Maneuver in West. for Brandei GENERAL SMITH TO COMMAND Great Sale Realistic Scenes Will Be Enacted in Monday Wyoming When Imaginary Encmies Are Drawn Up Against Each Other. The Western Division of the United States army is planning for maneuver campaigns jointly with the state militia. The commands at Fort Riley and Fort Leavenworth will march against each

other July 5, meeting at some point between the two posts. Four regiments of Kansas state militia will re-enforce these troops. Pole mountain, twenty miles west of Fort D. A. Russell, Wyo., near the high-

est point on the Union Pacific railroad, will be the scene of annual maneuvers of state militia, July 8 to 27, inclusive. One regiment of Nebraska guard, one Wyoming regiment and two Colorado commands will be detailed to take part. General Frederick A. Smith of the Department of the Missouri will be placed in command.

Approved by General.

This is part of a plan of maneuvers this summer referred to and approved by General Smith. The designation of the regiments that are to entrain for the field has not yet been made, but will probably be left to the discretion of the general.

Included in the arrangements the regular troops of Fort Russell, comprising "several regiments, will participate, the regular and the Nebraska and Wyoming regiments of militia to assemble at Pole mountain July 8.

The militia will complete field practice on July 17, if the prepared schedule is maintained, and the two Colorado regiments take their place the following day, these regiments to remain in the field until July 27.

Mimic Wartare Planned.

General Smith is also instructed to take mmand of the joint troops of Forts Mackenzie, Robinson and Meade after the training of militia at Pole mountain, the troops of the forts to assemble at the crossing of Cheyenne river by the Burlngton in southeastern Wyoming. A limic waffare is here to be arranged by the commanding general, for which planned a concentration of forces of Forts Mackenzie and Meade to oppose the strength of Fort Robinson to gain posseson of the river crossing. The general will probably accompany one of the columns to make his field inspection of that column during the operations and of the remainder after they all get into camp after the conflict.

The time allotted to the maneuvers of the regular troops at the crossing will a limited to a week or ten days, to allow General Smith ample time to take command of the Iowa National Guard annual maneuvers at Iowa Fails August 12.


