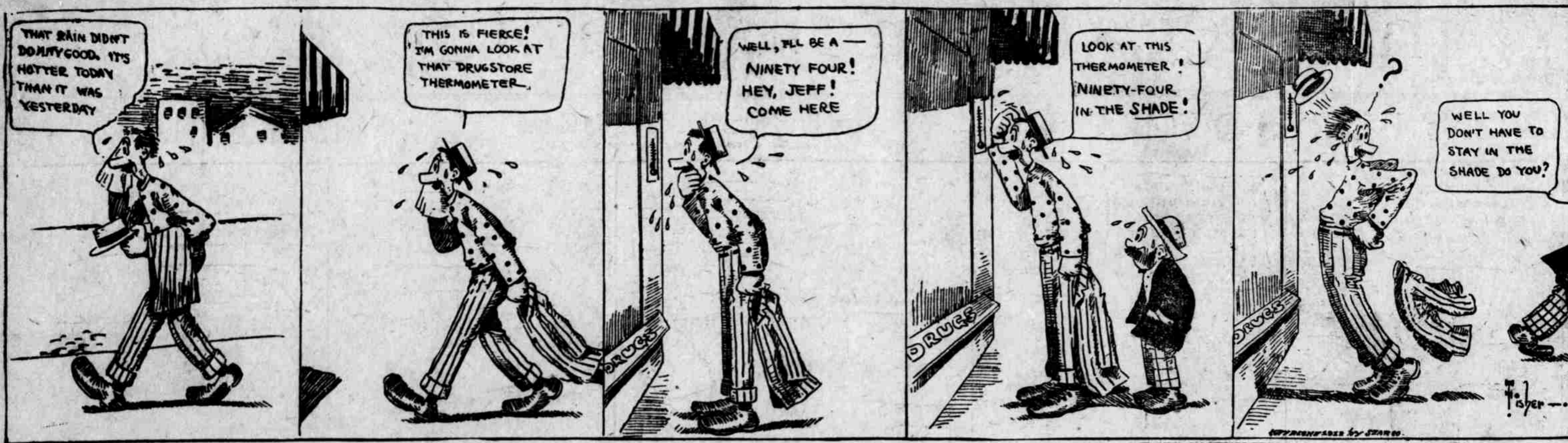

The Kaws snagged two in the opening frame and the Rourkes came back with one, and four in the fourth. In the sixth the Kaws made one and another in the seventh. Here it was that Rhodes began to put them over in great shape and held the Kansans without another hit or run.
