GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

More Friendly Feeling Created on Buying Side of Wheat.

CORN RESERVES NOT SELLING

Practically No Headway is Made for Some Time in Foreing a Lower Level in the Oats Market.

OMAHA, Aug. 13, 1912. The stubbornness of the wheat market around the 92-cent level for the active menths and the failure of the trade to force a 90-cent level during the early heavy marketing period of winter wheat and the successful finish of the big northwest crop, at the same time, have created a more friendly feeling on the buying side. Even those who are supporting the market and buying on breaks fall to see anything that suggests an active bull campaign. Wet weather over the north, if sufficient to delay or injure the harvest might give the market a strong turn. The decrease in the Chicago stocks and the absence of any cold wheat supplies on the selling of September corn, because old corn is in light supply and cash prices

Primary corn receipts were 298,000 bushels and shipments 386,000 bushels, against receipts of 454,000 bushels and shipments of 272,000 bushels last year.

Primary oats receipts were 1,355,000 bushels and shipments 445,000 bushels against receipts of 777,000 bushels and shipments of 425,000 bushels last year.

Regardless of this outlook there is Regardless of this outlook there is some nervousness among short traders even in the later months, which makes it look as if the entire market from September to May was somewhat oversoid, previous to the recent raily. Perfect weather should bring a return of selling pressure on the hard spots in the late months. Cash corn, ½c to 2c higher. The feeling is very bearish in the oats trade. Practically no headway has been made for some time in forcing a lower level. Traders are selling oats on bulges, for they say the market cannot go up

Trading, which began with prices unchanged, to 4c lower, stiffened toward the end, with advances in all futures.

September fluctuated between from 69%c and 71c, finishing at the high point %20%c. December ranged from 54%c to 55c, the last sales being a shade higher 54%c. Number 2 yellow was quoted at 77% 678c.
