#### Reds Fail to Pierce Center of Blues

MANEUVER HEADQUARTERS, STRATFORD, Conn., Aug. 15 .- An attempt to pierce the center of the Blue army, defending New York City, failed this morning and for the time being the enemy's advance was successfully checked. Today's battle, although five infantry regiments and six troops of cavalry were engaged, was only preliminary to an approaching general engagement which will involve upwards of 15,000 men.

The two armies now face each other on an eight-mile front, extending southeasterly from Danbury, where the Blues have their base. The first move forward by the Reds is expected to bring on a battle, for both commanders are concentrating their forces at this point.

Twenty-Five Thousand Fans Gather to Watch Defeat of the Giants.

LEADERS MAKE A LONELY RUN

Finish of Pitcher Marquard Comes in the Fifth, When He is Batted Out of the Box and Five Runs Scored.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.-Chicago today won the opening game of the series from New York, 5 to 1, driving Marquard out of the box in the fifth and mowing down New York's lead in the race for the National league pennant to five games. It was estimated that 25,000 persons witnessed the contest. Every available spot n the grounds was occupied and thousands had to be denicht admission to the park for the lack of space.

Marquard's finish came in the fifth inning. With Archer out, Richie singled and Sheckard walked. Merkle got Schulte's fly. Tinker drove a slashing double into the right field crowd, scoring Richie.
