tional Base Ball commission today ruled that a clause in the constitution of a minor league prohibiting the acceptance by one of its clubs of a player under an Fielding of Weaver is Feature of optional agreement is in conflict with the revised national agreement, therefore null and void.

A minor league club may, however, for business reasons, decline to enter into an optional agreement with a major league club or a minor league club of higher classification, but its privileges to do so can not be restricted or nullified by legislation of its league.

The ruling was made by the commis sion on requests from the president of the Connecticut State league and several other minor league executives.
