HICKS HANDS LOPES DEFEAT

Harry Helps Pa's Rangers to Nice Four to Two Victory.

SHOWS HIS FORM IN SEVENTH

Issues Pitches in Order to Catch Left-Handed Berghammer, Which He Does in a Very Neat Manner.

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 11.—(Special Telegram.)—Fast fielding and clever work in the box on the part of Harry Hicks helped the Omaha Rangers to hand Lincoln a 4 to 2 defeat here this afternoon, when a postponed game was played off. The work of Justice at short and Coyle in right field was a feature. Hagerman, who went the pace for seven innings was off on control, walking five men, Tuckey, who relieved him, allowed one walk, which blossomed into a score.

Hicks showed his mettle in the seventh inning when with two men on bases, and two down he purposely walked Hagerman, who was batting, in order to get at Berghammer, a left-handed hitter. Berghammer grounded out and retired the side.

A ninth inning rally was cut short with two men on bases by a double play after Coyle had made a star catch of McLary's fly against the right field fence.

Two runs for the Bourkes came in the first inning. Justice singled and went to second on Coyle's sacrifice. Thomson was walked. Johnson doubled to Barbour who tagged Justice. Johnson reached first. Kane doubled to left center scoring Thomson and Johnson.

With one down in the fourth Hagerman walked Schipke. The "slipper" stole second and when Mullen dropped Barbour's throw after fielding Scanlon's grounder, Schipke scored.

DOANE CLAIMS RECORD FOR LONG INNING GAME

CRETE, Neb., Sept. 11.—To the Sporting Editor of The Bee: In last Sunday's Bee there was an article concerning a baseball game played between Madison and Wayne which went nineteen innings with a score of 11 to 9, and in which only one pitcher was used by each team. The writer of the article claimed that this was a new record for base ball game played that number of innings with a 1 to 0 score and only one pitcher.

This record, however, was beaten by four full innings last year in an inter-collegiate base ball game when Doane college defeated Peru Normal 1 to 0 in a game that took twenty-three innings to play off the tie. Stevens, now with the Superior State league team, pitched for Peru and Kreisinger, still at Doane, pitched for the winning side, and they both went the entire twenty-three innings, neither one of them allowing over four or five hits in what would be two games and a half had only nine innings been played. If there is any record to be hung up with that kind of a game this should very clearly set the Madison-Wayne game out of the running for the honor.
