Georgia Peach Crop Big-According to the report sent to Commercial Agent Wullf, the local agent of the Southern Railway company, the peach crop of Georgia this year has been far from a failure. This year out of Georgia alone the Southern has handled 5,334 carloads of peaches, as compared with 826 cars during the season of 1911. Over all lines this year Georgia sent out 7.139 cars of peaches. Of the shipment, 4,665 cars went to eastern markets, being handled in solid trainloads from Atlanta to Washington. Of the crop, 319 came to the western markets.




