RECEIPTS HERE ARE LIGHT Only Forty-Three Cars of Wheat,

Thirty-Eight of Corn and Twenty of Oats Arrive for Local Disposal.

With wheat off nearly 2 cents from Tuesday and the Omaha cash market ranging from % to 30 cents per bushel, eccipts were the lightest in several days. On the market there were but fortythree cars of wheat, thirty-eight of corn and twenty of cats.




