

Officers Arrest Three Hundred Who Fail to Indicate Direction.

POLICE PROTECT PEDESTRIANS

Golden Rule Summonses Issued to Large Number of Violators of Ordinance, Including Profes-

sions; and Business Men. Between 3s and 25s drivers of Automobiles, trucks, wagons and corruges must appear in police court within twenty-four ours because of faiture to heed that por tion of the truffic ordinance which requires drivers of vehicles at busy corner to indicate their intended direction. Every driver who through neglect of the "high ball' ordinance became ontangled and caused confusion at congested intersections was immediately served with a golden rule" summons to police court. In the list of violaters of the rule is to be found members of almost every profession and trade.

Traffic Officer Hert Rodgers at Fourcenth and Parnam ran out of summon early in the morning and had to send to headquarters for more. By noon he had placed forty-five persons under technical arrest.
