# Senate Democrats Vote to Retain Tax on Bank Capital

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.-Democrats of the senate finance committee today after prolonged debate in executive session decided to retain the proposed tax of \$2 a thousand on bank capital and surplus in party machine against Bryan and Wilson the war revenue bill, as it passed the in 1916. 
