Farmers Call a Halt on the Sale of Their Wheat.

GRAINS ARE SOMEWHAT LOWER

Wheat One-Half of One Cent Off, While Corn Widens to One Cent Higher to Half Lower—Oats Down a Fraction.

OMAHA, October 7, 1914. Farmers in both the winter and spring wheat belt have called a halt in the matter of wheat sales, as the present price is not to their liking.

Speculation in wheat has narrowed down to the room trading element, and hedging sales which were in evidence yesterday are exceptional.

Corn was heavy and closed around the lowest level reported and showed net losses for the day.

Provisions were liquidating to some extent yesterday. This was the case, particularly in the case of hams.

Wheat was 1/2 cent higher, corn was 1/2 cent lower.

What made the backward swing of values conclusive was the announcement that big tentative sales of flour from American and Canadian mills to a supposed representative of the French and Belgian armies were being cancelled.

Corn made only a temporary dip in response to the market in wheat.
