MURAL PAINTINGS PLACED OUT OF DOORS AT FAIR

For the first time in the history of world's expositions, at the Panama-Pacific International exposition, great mural paintings are being used out of doors. These are the work of some of the most famous painters, including the celebrated "Ten American Painters." Two huge canvases, each 6x12 feet, by Frank Du Mond and Edward Simmons, will shortly be placed in the triumphal arches in the Court of the Universe. Du Mond's canvases depict the movement of immigration from New England westward to California and the labors of the empire builders in the golden land. Simmons' paintings are more purely allegorical, with many female figures done in soft bright tones with novel and masterly technique.

Rotary Clubs Will Convene at Frisco During Exposition

The International Association of Rotary Clubs will meet in San Francisco the week of July 29, 1915. Five thousand delegates will attend the convention. To gain the international meetings for San Francisco the California Rotary Clubs sent an invitation to their affiliated bodies throughout the world a badge of solid gold, valued at \$10,000 and comprised of a number of wheels bearing the emblems of the Rotary clubs invited.

Chinese Building Material Arrives

The steamer Manchuria brought from China in the latter part of September 10 tons of building material, artistic wood carving and special fittings for the Chinese pavilion and temple at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. The material for a duplicate of a famous temple in Peking came complete in "knock-down" shape, ready to be erected in the gardens west of the Fine Arts palace at the exposition.

WILD WHITE CATTLE TO BE DISPLAYED AT BIG FAIR

Specimens of the famous Chillingham wild cattle have been offered by Lord Chillingham for exhibition at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. These cattle were first enclosed in Chillingham park in 1770, since which time there has not been a single infusion of new blood. The animals are snow-white, with black noses, black horns and red ears; they are exceedingly wild and fierce and are supposed to be the progenitors of most existing breeds of cattle outside of the orient. With the exception of two animals in the zoological gardens of London and these in Chillingham park, there is not another one of these cattle in the world.

Indiana to Display Vocational School

Indiana will make a wonderful educational exhibit at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. Special attention will be devoted to the consolidation of rural schools, agricultural, vocational work, domestic science and playground activities. The remarkable vocational work along the lines laid down by Tolstol in Russia, and by Ferrero in Spain, done in the all-day and all-purpose schools of Gary, Ind., will be extensively featured with demonstration classes. This system, the only one in operation in America, does away in large measure with books and recitations. William Parker, formerly of Omaha, is one of the instructors of this school.

YELLOWSTONE PARK TO BE PART OF BIG PANAMA ZONE

One of the strangest sights in the world is to be seen in the "Yellowstone Park," a great concession on "The Zone" at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. The concession covers more than four acres and is surrounded by cliffs rising more than 100 feet. The whole being painted to nature's colors and covered with shrubs, plants and moss to complete the illusion of naturalness. An exact duplication of Old Faithful Inn stands at one side of the concession, while in its center is the largest topographical map ever made, reproducing every feature of the Yellowstone park and 230 feet across. Geysers, a waterfall eighty-five feet in height and many superb spectacles are features of the display.

ARGENTINE INCREASES FUND FOR PANAMA FAIR

Within six weeks after the war broke out in Europe the Argentine increased its fund for participation in the Panama-Pacific International exposition at San Francisco from \$125,000 to \$1,700,000. Holland from \$100,000 to \$400,000; Spain for the first time decided to participate officially and the Spanish government appropriated a fund for that purpose; Japan and Cuba asked for increased exhibit space; France sent word that there was no change in its plans. Italy ordered construction rushed upon the superb Italian pavilion. Of the forty foreign governments which have committed themselves to participate not one has withdrawn.

NORWAY'S PLANS FOR THE PANAMA FAIR UNDER WAY

J. Heyderdahl-Hansen, commissioner to Norway representing the Norwegian-American organizations of the United States, has returned from Norway and announces that Norway's plans for participation in the Panama-Pacific International exposition are well advanced. Norway has appropriated \$2,500 for a pavilion and \$12,000 for a battleship to join the international fleet to pass through the Panama canal to the exposition grounds. In addition \$20,000 has been raised by Norwegian-American societies.

Exposition Notes

Sigma Chi, a national college fraternity with a membership of 15,000, has chosen San Francisco as the meeting place of its grand council in 1915.
Live stock pavilions covering forty acres have been constructed at the Panama-Pacific International exposition, which opens next February in San Francisco.
All but one of the great main exhibit palaces of the Panama-Pacific International exposition were completed five months before the exposition will open on February 20, 1915.
The National Association of Life Insurance Underwriters, with ninety-three affiliated organizations and a membership of over 6,000, has voted to hold its next convention at the Panama-Pacific International exposition.
The National Potato Association of America will meet in San Francisco in 1915. In connection with the convention there will be held an exhibit of huge proportions showing the production, distribution and marketing of the potato. A competitive exhibit of the potatoes grown by boys and girls in all parts of the United States is planned, under the supervision of the United States Department of Agriculture and agricultural colleges.
