GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Wheat sagged in price today, influenced by a full in export demand. The market closed unsettled, %@%c under last night. Corn finished %g%c off to %c up, oats %c down and provisions at an advance of \$655c.

Notwithstanding that wheat in the beginning showed a tendency to rise, sentiment quickly changed. The fact was soon apparent that the urgency of European buyers had been greatly leasened and that immediate purchasing on transatiantic account would not be of large proportions. Buils were also handleapped by dispatches from the northwest saying that farmers had been selling more freely.

On the decline exports here took \$60,000 but of wheat and did considerable buying at other centers. A moderate raily in quotations followed, but the effect was not lasting.

Assertions that prominent speculators had started a bull campaign in corn made that cereal cut loose from sympathy with the weakness of wheat.
