CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Immense export sales—possibly the largest ever known-gave the wheat market today an upward swing after a brier downturn at the start. Prices closed firm, %c to %@ic above Saturday night. Other leading staples, too, all scored a net advance—corn %@%c to %c, oats %c to %d%c and provisions 7%c to %c.

Foreigners seem to have virtually unlimited orders to buy wheat in every market in North America. The European demand was especially active at Winnipes, Duluth, Kanssa City and here. Canadian dispatches said Liverpool was taking wheat as fast as offered. In the United States demand from France was most conspicuous. Estimates of the total amount of export saies for the day ran as high as 2,500,000 bushels.

Fears that primary receipts of domestic wheat might undergo a sudden failing off stirred up speculators and added to the builtish sentiment due to the darker outlook in the war situation as affected by developments regarding Turkey. An increase in the United States visible supply total was regarded as offset by the lessening of the stock on hand in Canada.

In corn, as well as in wheat, export sales led to a change in sentiment and favored the builts. It was said that as much as \$60,000 bushels was taken here for Europe. On the other hand, traders were generally expecting increased receipts here soon. Hedging pressure on oats falled to keep prices down. Foreign buying and the strength of other grain proved influential.

Provisions were unsettled by conflicting reports about quarantine rules at the Chicato stock yards and elsewhere. Shorts did a good deal of covering, but on the ensuing buige there was free taking of profits by longs. The range of price changes turned out to be little, if at all, beyond what is usual under ordinary conditions.
