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MRS. DUNCAN DEAD, HUSBAND IS DYING

City Employee Falls in Paralytic Stroke and Wife Sick in Bed Cannot Help Him.

BOTH ARE TAKEN TO HOSPITAL.
Wife Dies and Husband So Sick He Cannot Be Told of Her Death—Former Employee of the Water Company.

Robert Duncan, city inspector in the department of public improvements and former city plumbing inspector, is at the point of death in St. Joseph's hospital, where his wife lies dead. Mrs. Duncan died at 10:45 o'clock Monday night.

Mr. Duncan suffered a paralytic stroke at his home, 2828 Davenport street, Monday. His wife, ill in bed, was unable to help him as he lay unconscious on the floor. Mrs. Thomas McGovern, wife of the city councilman, discovered them there.

Police Commissioner A. C. Kugel sent a police automobile to the home and the couple were removed to the hospital, where Mrs. Duncan died. Mr. Duncan is so ill that physicians are withholding from him information of his wife's death. Mr. Duncan was an employe of the old water company and then of the Water board for about twenty years. Two years ago he accepted a position with the city.

Mail Business of Omaha is Showing Steady Increase.
A permanently increasing mail business here, combined with the Christmas rush, which is now assuming large proportions, has led to considerable increases in equipment and floor space, and to the addition of a number of extra clerks in the postoffice and the local railway mail service.

"We are glad that our advice to mail Christmas packages early is being heeded this year," says Assistant Postmaster James I. Woodard. "It will result in the holiday parcels being delivered in good condition and on time this year."

At the Burlington railway postoffice terminal, 7th square feet of extra floor space and \$1,200 worth of alterations and new equipment is now ready and will be put into use this week, Superintendent C. M. Reed says.

More equipment has been added at the Union depot postal station, in order to handle the increased mails, and the railway postoffice terminal at the Council Bluffs transfer has also been enlarged. The addition in railway mail equipment and floor space are necessitated by the permanently increased parcel post and other mail business, officials say. The Christmas rush has caused only the temporary employment of extra clerks.
