DODGE SORE ON CITY DADS

At Least that is What Commissioner Withnell Says of Senator.

NOT ACTUATED BY ECONOMY

State Legislator, on Contrary, is Declared to Be Fault-Finding Because Fire Barn Location Did Not Suit Him.

State Senator N. P. Dodge is "sore at the city commissioners," according to City Commissioner C. II. Withnell of the fire department, because the council refused to harken to the anxious plea of the senator in a certain matter. Mr. Withnell said:

"Dodge knows no money is being wasted in this department. Here is a list in detail of every cent that has been spent. day morning, is reported to be improving Dodge nor anybody else would have spent

"As for the double shift, which has increased the payroll to \$228,307.50 a year, Dora Foley and her husband, Dodge, if my memory serves me well, was very instrumental in securing it and was one of its loudest advocates.




